


As the saying goes, every day in every way, we are getting better and better!


The Challenges


Acknowledgements

As in previous years, we would not have been able to end the year on such a high note were it not for the support we got, throughout the year, from our good friends, neighbours and well wishers.


We therefore wish to thank all those who prayed for us, and those who donated various gifts in cash or in form of foodstuffs, books, clothes,
